STAR Program

The STAR program is up and running again in 2014. STAR stands for Student Training around Reading and aims to improve the literacy outcomes for Gilmore students. The STAR program works by working intensively with small groups of identified students and providing them with literacy support during their English and Society and Environment classes up to 3 times per week. Students practice their reading, predict what texts are about, develop their writing styles and improve their vocabulary.

At home, students can improve their literacy skills by reading every day. Reading any type of text, from magazines to comics, novels to picture books can improve their reading skills. Discussing what they have read with other people can improve comprehension and understanding of different topics.

Literacy Strategy

Year 8 students at Gilmore College participate in the Literacy Strategy which is a program designed to improve the literacy skills and abilities of all students. The Literacy Strategy incorporates English and Society and Environment outcomes as part of a structured, integrated program.

Year 8s have started the year studying Landforms and Landscapes and have researched and written reports on geomorphic hazards such as volcanoes, earthquakes and tsunamis. Throughout the year, students will also learn about Medieval Europe, narratives, Japans under the Shoguns, purpose of texts and varying audiences, Changing Nations and identity.
