## From The Principal

The examination season is well and truly upon us and as always, I would like to wish our students from Years 7-12 the best of luck for their NAPLAN's, Externally Set Tasks and formal examinations. Having said this though, the best kind of "luck" you can access when approaching any timed assessment, is your very best preparation in the lead up to those assessments, based on clear revision notes, an established study routine (including breaks) and the support of family and part time work, if applicable, to clear the way for you to take those assessments seriously.

I would like to take this opportunity to compliment the Gilmore College Community for its recent efforts in attendance. As part of our participation in the Fogarty Foundation's School Improvement Program the College has identified lifting regular attendance as a key objective. Naturally it is not a secret that students who regularly attend school (90% or more – 9 days out of every 10) have a better sense of belonging to that school, are less likely to experience serious mental health issues and more likely to succeed academically at school as a result of their attendance. Like many schools in the Kwinana and Rockingham area we have had a regular attendance rate lower than 50% - just under half of our students are attending in the "safe" zone of school engagement.

It is our wish to see this number jump significantly, but for now we have set the achievable target of 55% regular attendance for Semester One 2018. At the time of writing we are sitting "agonisingly close" to that target at 54.8% regular attendance. While this number is certainly a lift in our data and therefore outcomes for students, I'd like to urge everyone to "dig deep" as the first flu waves, colder weather, reports and tests hit. I'm sure that if we continue to work together, community and school, we can last the next four weeks until the mid-year break having achieved our 55% target. Thank you all for your efforts.

Next to regular attendance we have identified seven other objectives through our school improvement program that will eventually make up the school's next Business Plan (2018-2020). Under Curriculum and Teaching we are looking at improvements to the "way" students are taught and supporting teachers to observe each other teach more often to share expertise. Under Literacy and Numeracy, we are looking to implement school wide approaches to both areas, but we are also looking to engage with the wider Kwinana Community to help carers, parents, businesses and community groups through a focus

on reading and literacy/numeracy – particularly in the early years of schooling. Under **Pastoral Care** and **Learning Environment** we remain committed to implementing our Positive Behaviour School Plan around our acronym of SOAR (Supportive, Organised, Aspirational and Resilient), supporting students through our strong Student Services team and developing leadership among our staff and students. More information in detail on our 8 objectives for improvement in the next three years will be provided soon.

Finally, we are very grateful to everyone who responded to the recent "Tell Them From Me" parent, staff and student survey. The feedback from these surveys, as well as the input of our College Board, teaching and support staff, have helped to set the improvement agenda. Namely, we recognise ongoing that students have a right to feel safe at school and continue to work hard alongside our students to provide a safe environment. We also take on board issues around access to particular school programs, provision of specialist curricula, difficulties in communicating between parents and staff and focusing on celebrating all the positive things that are occurring in our school.

I look forward to keeping you all up to date on these improvement objectives over the next three years and telling the rest of the world what we already know – we have a good school in Kwinana and a staff, student body and community willing to work hard to make it even better.


They were iMEN in 2017 and were invited to talk to the new students about their time on the program and how they applied for the KIC Program and were accepted.



## **Bullying**




The students incorporated a variety of persuasive techniques, such as emotive and inclusive language slogans and

## Gilmore College leads the way at the 2018 Youth Civics Leadership Day

On Monday 15 May, Avaria Nepia and Rosemary Brown were two of four public school students who attended the 2018 Youth Civics Leadership Day at Stirling Gardens in Perth.

First they looked around the Old Court House, which is the oldest building in Perth. The Old Court House was used as a Court but also to host concerts and church services.

They walked over to the Supreme Court and went into Room 1 where Ram, a Burmese refugee, described his life in Burma and how much better it was since living in Australia. Ram had been imprisoned in Burma because he had no identification paper work and when he was released, he lived in a 2-bedroom flat with 45 other people. He was grateful to be living in Australia where he was able to access safe accommodation and education.





After a short recess, an Aboriginal woman named Jane told the students of her negative experiences with transit guards and the Snake Project. Priya, a Para-Olympian encouraged the students to never give up. She believed that anything is achievable with hard work and dedication.

The students enjoyed a subway lunch and networked with young lawyers before catching the train back home to Kwinana. Both girls reported that it was a good day and would recommend it to others in the future.



## How to make a Kidney Model with General Human Biology

This Term we have been looking at the digestive and urinary systems of the human body. To improve our understanding of how the kidney's work, we constructed our own models following the steps below.

#### Method:

- 1. Cut two water bottles in half.
- 2. Attach a piece of plastic tubing to the bottle using modelling clay, making a clay plug to place into the opening of the water bottle (where the lid normally screws). Ensure that the plastic tubing is open to the inside of the bottle but that there are no gaps between the tubing and the clay and between the bottle and the clay. The bottles are the two "kidneys," and the tubes are the "ureters."
- 3. Tape the two "kidney" water bottles onto the retort stand.
- 4. Tape a funnel "bladder" to the retort stand underneath the two "kidneys," and tape the two "ureters" to the inside of the funnel.
- 5. Carefully place a filter (you can use coffee filters) into each "kidney."
- 6. Mix some tea leaves into some water.
- 7. After placing a container underneath the funnel, pour the tea solution into the "kidneys."
- 8. Observe the "kidneys" filtering out the tea leaves...
- 9. ...as the water runs down the ureters and exits through the funnel. The tea actually changes the water to a yellowish colour! (Yuck! Gross!)



#### **Materials:**

Retort Stand with a clamp
Filters (Coffee filters will do)
Plastic tubing
Modelling clay
Two empty water bottles
Funnel
Tape
Tea Leaves
Water
Small pitcher
Container for the 'urine'
