As this article goes to press we are finalising the last touches to our current Business Plan. The school priorities moving forward into our next three-year cycle of improvement are,

- · Excellence in Teaching
- Academic Achievement
- Learning Environment
- Connection with Community

We will continue to work on further gains in partnership with our families and local community. You will see below that we have a clear strategic approach to the future and how we can build on our already staggering improvement from the last three years.

As part of our commitment to continuing to develop excellence in teaching, we are working to embed high impact instruction techniques and develop champions within the majority of our teaching staff. This has been an ongoing part of our last Business Plan and continues to be a focus moving forward.

In 2023 we will be sending staff to complete **Professional Learning** in a variety of workshops aligned to high impact instruction. The last of our Level 3 management team are involved in the Fogarty Secondary Teacher Leaders workshops, which will mean all management team members will have now completed this work, integral to their supporting teachers in the classroom to be 'the best that they can be' and improve our student outcomes beyond the incredible gains already made.

A number of our teaching staff are also engaging with the **TeachWell** programme, which is an evidence based program that focuses on current research into cognitive science and instructional techniques that have proven success in adding to student achievement. I am also committed to involving a number of our staff in the upcoming '**Teaching for Impact**' program that is about to be rolled out by the Department of Education. The work of our Classroom Management Strategies (CMS) and our Whole School Instructional Model (WSIM) coaches, Helen Hocking and Isabella Moore, continues to strengthen the whole staff which will further support your children to meet their own unique learning potential.

Our Media Room extension work and the refurbishment of the Health and Physical Education (HPE) office as part of our Gymnasium improvement project are nearing completion. We hope to see our HPE staff relocate into their new office very shortly and the Media Room extension is scheduled for completion early in Term 3. Many thanks to both the HPE staff and our new Media teacher for the way in which they have minimised disruption to students due to these works and ensured that the delivery of curriculum has remained streamlined and consistent, ensuring that student outcomes have not been impacted.

At Gilmore College we truly do believe in our Moral Purpose, that 'We transform positive relationships, with students and families, into meeting the unique learning potential of every student'.

### **Students Services News**

Associate Principal Ms Clayton has been tirelessly working to enrich the work already being done by our Student Services team to support our students' mental health and well-being at Gilmore College.

This is an ongoing program of work that seems to have no end in this day and age when Mental Health issues in our young people has never been higher. These issues sometimes manifest in poor behaviour and attendance and occasionally in serious issues of misconduct. Our team continues to work with our students to change these behaviours in an educative and responsible way. Being punitive is always our last resort and we know that the successes are not as easily recognised, but we continue to celebrate the many successes that our team are in no small way, responsible for.



In an effort to improve the safety of our students and to ensure that we continue to work towards an orderly learning environment as a pre-cursor to successful teaching we will be moving to a single gate entry at the commencement of Term 3.

All students will be required to enter the school grounds in the morning through the main Dargin Place gate alongside the administration building. This will also serve as an opportunity to welcome our students to school in the morning and act in a supportive way in ensuring that students are more likely to comply with uniform and mobile phone requirements at the school.

We are excited that this will go in some small way to reducing the incidents of non-compliance with school rules with respect to Uniform and Mobile Phone use and may reduce our need to be punitive in our approach.

The vast majority of our students will continue to be, as always, supportive and follow school rules. Hopefully we will be able to use this opportunity to support those that want to, but for many reasons have been unable to, comply with school guidelines on these and other issues.

This will also allow us to better ensure the safety of students through the school day by ensuring our students are recognisable as students at Gilmore College.

I know, as a community, that we all value and understand the need for rules in a school environment and we hope that we continue to have your support in these endeavours.

## Every Day Counts.....

It is an unfortunate truth, that attendance at Gilmore College remains, in my opinion, the biggest issue that we face.

At the end of Term 1 our regular attendance has continued to remain at a very low 30.7%. This means only 1 in 3 students are attending school 90% of the time or more. Even at 90%, this means a student is missing one day per fortnight and potentially missing up to 20 days of school per year.



While 56% of our students are still maintaining an attendance rate in excess of 80% (80% attendance means 1 day per week and up to 40 missed days per year) this still remains the greatest barrier to our students achieving their maximum potential.

Every period missed, every day missed, de-values the work we do on a day to day basis to improve the outcomes for our students and maximise their ability to seek gainful employment or training beyond year 12.

Every period missed, contributes to this poor data. This is also compounded by the fact that 70% of our absences are still not accounted for. We are not receiving information from families to explain these absences.

In comparison to this, pre-CoVid, our regular attendance (90%+) was at 57.8% and 76.4% of students were here in excess of 80%. Our severe attendance category, those students here less than 60% of school days has increased from 8.7% of students to 23.5%. I know CoVid has a large part to play in these figures, but we cannot assist you to get the most from our students without increasing this attendance rate.

We understand absences are often unavoidable, but from an employment point of view, how many jobs exist that will allow our children to take a day or more off each fortnight.

## How can our children expect to achieve their full potential when they are so often absent?

How much **critical work** is missed during these absences? How much **disruption and time pressure** does this put on staff to be constantly going back over critical content for those students whose attendance is not up to standard? What is the **impact** of this constant re-teaching for those students who are here every day?

As mentioned previously, this plays into students achieving lower than expected grades, as missed assessments without an adequate explanation can often result in a mark of 0. Ultimately we want all of our students to achieve, we want them to be successful not just at school, but beyond.

We aim for 100% achievement of Western Australia Certificate of Education (WACE) at the end of Year 12, but we cannot do this alone and neither can you. Please work with us to strengthen our attendance and let's get these figures back to pre-CoVid levels and even higher. It is not okay to be away.

Clontarf Partners help fund the program which assists our boys in gaining access to employment opportunities and career pathways. The day pitched 2 of our boys with 2 representatives from each Partner and allowed the boys to liaise with High level corporate partners and discuss plans for post Year 12 and potential career pathways.

Everyone played 6 holes of "Best Ball" golf and the day concluded with a lunch upstairs at the clubhouse.

The activity was amazing in giving the boys a taste of what is to be expected entering the workforce and also relieve some of the unknowns about how they will go interacting with people in a workplace, once they finish school.

The Golf Club allowed us to use the driving range for free in the lead-up and lent us Golf Clubs and balls to practice with. To organise the day for us they had to move a few things around

to ensure it went seamlessly which included getting in early to cater the food – all reports about the food came back positively too. We are very grateful for their can-do attitude and it wouldn't have run anywhere near as well without their support.

We also wish to thank the school and staff who made this event possible for the 12 participating boys.

## **Indigenous Australian Engineering School 2022**

Year 10 Follow the Dream student Daniel Russell and Year 11 Follow the Dream student Taj Bennell, have been accepted into the 2022 Indigenous Australian Engineering School at Curtin University in July.

The Indigenous Australian Engineering School (IAES) is a week-long residential camp introducing students to engineering studies and careers. Students will meet industry representatives and participate in educational activities.

### The program will include:

- Site visits with engineering companies like Arcadis, Aurecon, Arup, BOC, Honeywell, SMEC and Woodside;
- Hands-on and engaging engineering activities;
- Discussions with university academic staff to explore engineering concepts;
- Cultural activities with local Aboriginal organisations; and
- Some good social times with the other students.

Connect is the Department of Education's online environment which will provide teachers, students and families with secure access to a collaborative online learning environment via the internet.

The aim of Connect is to provide a secure internet service that will allow teachers to provide information about the teaching and learning activities occurring in the classroom directly to the families of students in this class. Participation in Connect is optional for families and if you would like to take part, you will require internet access and a computer. No additional software is required. The Department of Education will issue you with a unique user name and password which will provide you with access to Connect.

Initially, Connect will allow teachers to provide general class information to you about the teaching and learning activities that his/her class are undertaking. In the future, the service may be further developed to allow more flexible communication between families and teachers, as well as providing personalised information about your child's learning activities and progress.

In order for you to take part in Connect, please see main Administration for a Connect Registration form. Once completed and returned you will then be confidentially issued with your unique user name and password, as well as access details for Connect.

- show commitment to the welfare of others through community service





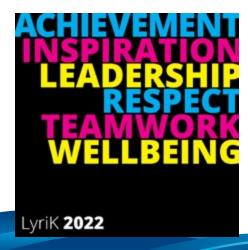

### PLEASE READ: IMPORTANT MESSAGE

In **Term 3** there will be an additional School Development Day on Tuesday 19 July. This is a student free day and students will return to school on Wednesday 20 July at 8:30am.

The School Development Day will give teaching staff the opportunity to progress our work within the current school business planning model and develop skills and strategies to further enhance the gains already made in student achievement.

## Single Entry Gate

At Gilmore College, the safety of our staff, students and community is our highest priority. As a result, the arrangements for students arriving at school will change to the following at the start of Term 3:

College gates located along Berthold Street and the school oval will be locked and all students will be required to enter the College via the Administration front gates located on Dargin Place. All gates will be open for students to exit at the end of the school day.

When dropping off your child, please use the designated drop-off/pick-up car bays located on either side of Dargin Place. Vehicles can loop around using Orelia Ave and Sulphur Rd if needed. Please do not use the staff/visitor parking as a turn-around/drop-off point as this does add to the congestion in the area and also compromises student safety.

Thank you for your understanding and support in helping us implement this new safety measure. Having one entry point will enable College staff to better monitor the arrival of all students and visitors to the school.

## College Uniform Policy and Procedures

### 1. Purpose

To ensure that the dress requirements at Gilmore College are effectively managed.

### 2. Policy

- The Principal is responsible for establishing policy and procedures that manage school dress requirements at the College.
- The College Uniform Policy is developed by the College Board in accordance with the Department of Education policy and guidelines on dress standards for students in public schools.
- All students are required, as a condition of their enrolment, to comply with the College Uniform.
- Upon enrolling their children at Gilmore College, parents/caregivers agree to support and reinforce the College Uniform with their children.
- Denim items are excluded from the College Uniform.
- Hooded jumpers are excluded from the College Uniform.

#### 3. Procedures

#### 3.1 Underpinning Principles

At Gilmore College, the following principles guide the standards of what is acceptable clothing to be worn by students and is therefore the designated uniform.

These principles are:

- Fosters and enhances the public image of the College.
- Assists in building aspirational students who represent the College with pride.
- Ensures students are safely dressed for specific College activities.
- Enables teachers to quickly identify our own students from intruders on College premises.
- Encourages equity among students.
- Prepares students for work as many work places have dress and safety codes.
- Is economical for parents/caregivers.

### 3.2 Developing and Changing the College Uniform

Section 128c of the School Education Act (1999) delegates responsibility to the College Board to determine the College Uniform in consultation with the College community.

Changes to the College Uniform are based on:

- Advice from students, parents/caregivers, and staff.
- Information from regular reviews of the uniform.

### 3.3 Middle School (Years 7 – 9)

Polo shirt (dark navy blue panel). White sports polo School navy micro fibre zip jacket. Plain navy jacket – no hood Plain navy trousers or track pants Plain navy shorts or skirt School dress

### 3.4 Senior School (Years 10 – 12)

Polo shirt (ice blue panel). White sports polo. School navy micro fibre zip jacket. Plain navy jacket – no hood Plain navy trousers or track pants Plain navy shorts or skirt School dress.

#### 3.5 Footwear

Flat, fully enclosed footwear is a requirement at the College. This is a health and safety issue.

### 3.6 Hats

Students are encouraged to wear hats or caps. These must be removed while inside the College buildings.

### 3.7 Other permitted uniform items

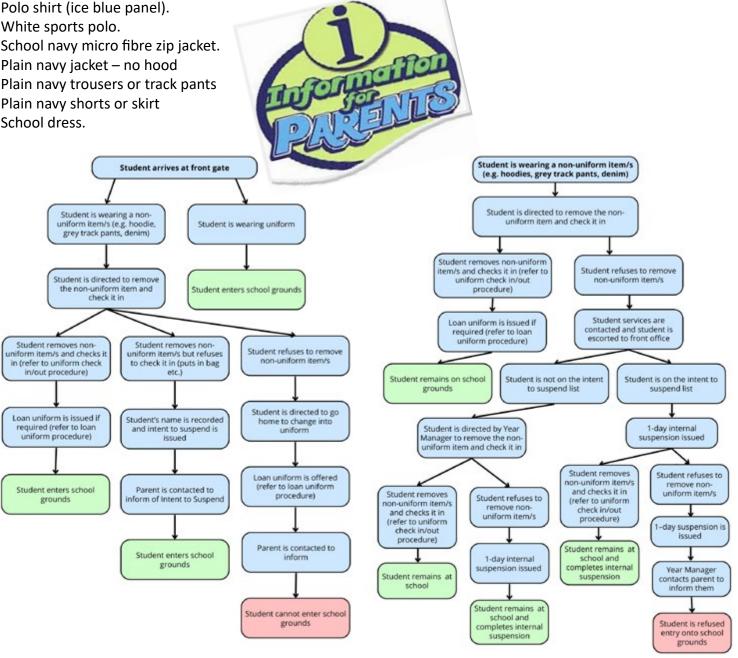

All students will be expected to wear full College uniform on excursions.

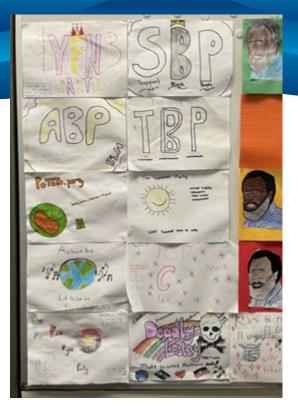
### 3.9 Uniform Processes (below)

## **Economics** and **Business**

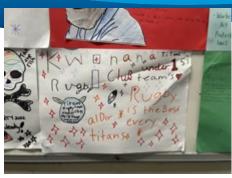
In Miss Pritchard's Humanities and Social Sciences 8.7 class, we have

The class focused on Koomal Dreaming which is owned by Wadandi/Bibbulmun man, Josh Whiteland in Wadandi Country. Koomal means brush-tailed possum and is his totem. He offers a First Nations' perspective of some of WA's south-west tourist attractions, including Ngilgi Cave. Visitors can taste native foods, discover bush medicine, and experience traditional fire lighting.

## Institute of Medical Research

This Year 12 ATAR Human Biology excursion is a highlight for students, proving to open students' eyes to more than just the curriculum content we are covering.

We were teamed up with a class of students from a northern suburbs private school. Feeling a bit intimidated at first, Mrs Pilkington encouraged the Gilmore students to be brave and confident in themselves to answer questions, and they did exactly that. This has been the best group of students to interact with the workshop presenter and show off their knowledge AND, two of our teams won the PCR race, taking home the all-important pen-trophy and bragging rights.

Students worked alongside researchers to complete a polymerase chain reaction (PCR) in order to diagnose a mutation in melanoma patients. They experimented with real DNA from real patients, using high tech equipment in a lab that gave students a feel for what life as a ground-breaking researcher might be like. All of our Gilmore College groups produced wonderful DNA products without contamination and were able to find the mutation in the affected patients.

The hands-on nature of the Perkins workshop is invaluable in consolidating these often difficult to understand procedures in the Human Biology syllabus. It is so pleasing to watch our students gain so much from the experience. Thank you Year 12's for embracing this opportunity and taking as much as you could from it.

## SmArts Program North Metro TAFE

Sixteen Year 11 and 12 students were fortunate to be involved in a 3-day excursion to North Metro TAFE from 1-3 June 2022.

This excursion involved students experiencing and trying three different full day workshops in three different creative industries. This opportunity was made possible by the Smith Family and the SmArts program, designed to provide students who are interested in creative arts with links to art organisations and relevant career information.

It aims to raise student's education aspirations and career knowledge of the creative arts through an interconnected creative program.

### 2nd June 2022 Product Design Program

Students worked through the design process to develop a pair of funky eyewear prototypes.

Students firstly learnt about their target user focusing on ergonomics, face shapes and face anatomy. Students developed concept drawings and designs from their mood boards.

Drawings were then scanned into a computer and cut from acrylic using a laser cutter. We used heat on the arms so they could be bent into shape and then students picked from precut-coloured lenses to finish off their prototype.

On Sunday, 29 May Gilmore College staff and students attended the City of Kwinana Community Tree Planting event at Henry Reserve, Wellard.

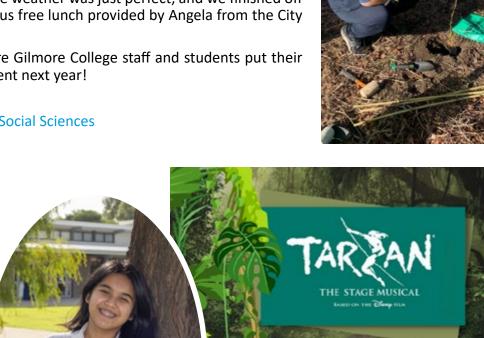
For three hours, staff and students diligently planted over 800 native seedlings, to help improve the habitat for the local bandicoot population.

## Reconciliation Artwork

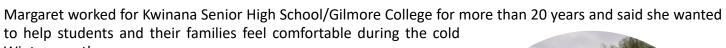
During Reconciliation Week, our Aboriginal Follow the Dream students invited a non-Aboriginal friend to join them in creating a piece of art together.

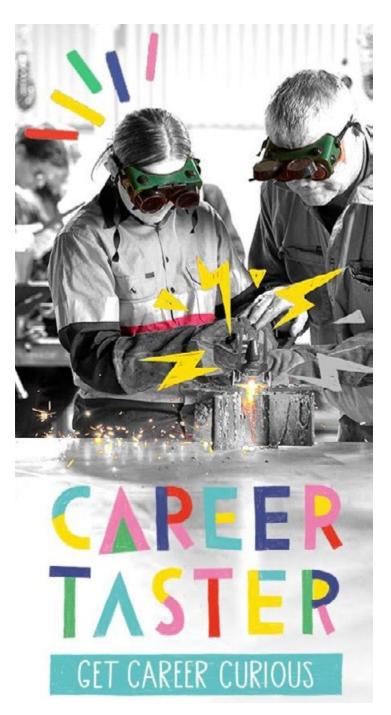

We are currently developing the Year 9 Career Taster Program (CTP) to inspire our students to start thinking about the future and become 'career curious' about further study options and potential careers.

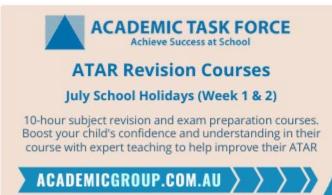
Students will have the opportunity to explore different industries and gain some hands-on experience.

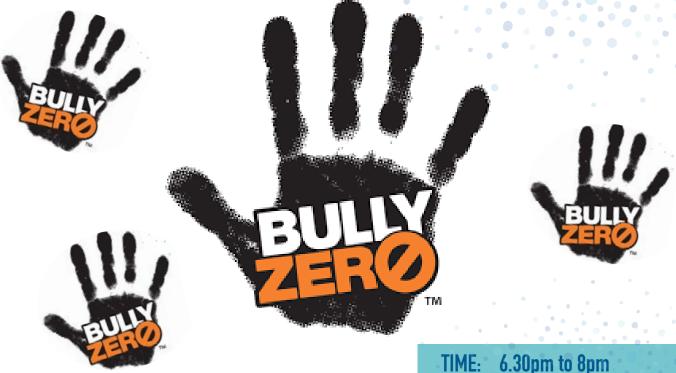
